
ATOS Convention concert artist, Justin Stahl return to the Barton!

Justin Stahl is a native of Beech Grove, Indiana. Beginning at age five with the encouragement of his great-grandfather, Justin was mostly self-taught in piano and organ. His passion for music has reached many venues that have included accompanying for several choral departments, contributing as his church's music director, playing for community theatre, and serving for over twelve years in the Indiana Army National Guard Band.

Justin has most recently entertained thousands of patrons of the Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra in the last three productions of their annual Yuletide Celebration, playing the 3/24 Wurlitzer installed at the Hilbert Circle Theatre. Theatre organ has always been an "advanced hobby" of Justin's and it has taken him to performance venues in Birmingham, Detroit, Boston, Joliet, and Erie. Most recently, Justin was a featured artist at the 59th ATOS Convention held in Indianapolis.

A graduate of Marian University with a Bachelor's degree in piano performance, Justin teaches at the Charles A. Tindley Accelerated School, where he serves as a choral director. His approach and philosophy includes the continued promotion

of the theatre organ by using a wide base of musical genres.

David Rhodes began taking piano lessons at the age of 7 and classical organ training at 12. His organ instructor for 8 years was Fr. John Palmer C.S.V., a professor at Benedictine University and director for the Roy-al Conservatory of Music. Having heard the theatre organ interludes at the Tivoli Theatre at the age of 14, he was hooked. David has played for various types of programs and special events at the Arcada Theatre in St. Charles, Rialto Theatre in Joliet, Coronado Theatre in Rockford and the York

Theatre in Elmhurst. David premiered the 2/7 Wurlitzer at St. John Cantius Church in Chicago. He is currently one of the staff organists at the Tivoli a position that he has held for the past 9 years and also plays pre-program music at Downers Grove North High School on their 3/10 Wurlitzer. In addition, David is involved in the res-restoration of the Wurlitzer theatre pipe organ in the George Cardinal Mundelein Auditorium at the University of Saint Mary of the Lake and the many other **CATOE** sponsored instruments.
