DAVE CALENDINE

By day, he works in the operations department of Olympia Entertainment in downtown Detroit. By night (and, well, sometimes during the day too), he's the resident organist and organ curator for Detroit's 5,100-seat Fox Theater, the organist for the Detroit Red Wings, an occasional accompanist for the Radio City Rockettes, and a solo concert performer. Calendine got his start in music at the age of 3, when his parents got a player piano from his uncle, who restored player pianos, nickelodeons and band

organs. By 5, he was taking piano lessons, which tapered off for him around 9 years old as he continued to learn and play by ear. By the time he was 15, he'd noticed the organ at his church and was fascinated by the myriad sounds it could make. He started taking lessons from church organist Dorothy Reynolds, who was an honors graduate of the Eastman School of Music in Rochester, N.Y., and it was all about the organ from that point on. More specifically, the theater organ. "The theater organ, or cinema organ, is so much more versatile than a regular pipe organ," Calendine said. Specially developed to provide music and sound effects to accompany silent films during the early 20th century, the theater organ adds in percussion and a wider range of sounds to the usual range of keyboard notes.

The JATOE work crew is still hard at work! To date, all the solo tremulants have been rebuilt. That's seven of them and four on the main side. We have a few more to go on the main side. The sleigh bells have come down to the work shop in the basement. They are being completely overhauled. All new leather and new reiteration contacts. New leather straps for the bells too. Our main concern when doing all this is to make it easier for who ever will do this work the next time they have to be rebuilt. Leather should last 25 to 30 years. That most likely mean none of the present work crew now will be around to do it again. Everything is being labeled too. When we take items like the trems down for repair, we look to see where it has failed. We see that holes in the leather are all in the same place. Its where the dowel rod pushes up to shut the trem off. There is a disk on the end of that rod that would rub against the leather bellow. The constant on/off action of the trem causes a hole in the bellow from the disk rubbing against the bellow. Those disks have been removed. After the sleigh bells, the chimes will come down to be rebuilt. The front of the solo chamber, where these percussions are will be reconfigured. The plan is to bring the chimes down and put them where the sleigh bells were. The "rope" that holds the chime tubes does eventually break. The long drop could easily damage the chime tube. Putting them where the sleigh bells were eliminates the long drop.


