# MAJOR OVERHAUL OF THE CONSOLE WIRING

The first major overhaul of the Barton Grande Theater Pipe Organ since the middle 1980's has started. Below is the new keyboard and piston junction board that allows the keyboards to be removed for maintenance. The wiring harness for the stops was also reconfigured so the horseshoe can be raised to its maintenance position to get to the keyboards







### JATOE WORK CREW UPDATE **BARTON CONSOLE GETS REWIRED**

Before Pictures, Getting ready for Monday








Crew Chief Lee Rajala removing covers on the input cages

Right side syndynes pulled thru.


The JATOE Board had decided to invest the money for this much needed project. There were plenty of "jumper" wires on the syndynes to make them work and just recently when Taylor Trimby was playing for a movie night, a couple of reed stops stopped playing. Some alligator clips on the syndynes made them work again for the time being. There is not enough wiring to raise the console to get to the keyboards, another reason for this project. On June 24th, Brian Koziel from Peterson started the rewiring of the Barton console. A \$8000+ project. This will correct everything. It will remove the "junk wiring" that does nothing and is just hanging in the console. Syndynes are grouped into groups of 24. Everything will be labeled. The keyboards and pistons are pluggable for easy removal. During the 2 months, the work crew can not go to the theater, the accomp keyboard was removed and taken to Lee's house so we can make the necessary repairs. When we are allowed to go back into the theater, the keyboard will be reinstalled.








### **AFTER PICTURES**









As of June 28th, minor problems still need to be corrected. We can't get in the theater again until Sept 1st, So Brian will have to come back again and correct what needs to be corrected. It should only take one more day to do that. When this is done another major milestone will be completed. First was making everything play that is in the chambers, second was the rewiring of the console. Third will be the rebuilding of the pipe chests. Many are in need of an overhaul.

It took 4, 8 hour days. 9am to 5pm. That was the time schedule we had from the theater. To tell the truth, if the theater didn't give us the time to do this project, we were just going to scrap the whole idea and do the best we could to keep the organ going. While Lee kept busy with Brian, the rest of us went to the work room and started to put things away and covering everything in plastic to prepare for the asbestos removal planned in the basement. When we return Sept 1st, The chimes will go back in along with the tuned sleigh bells. Two cymbals need to be relocated and some reconfiguration of the wind lines to make it all work.
